HARMFUL & PROBLEMATIC SEXUAL BEHAVIOUR SERVICE

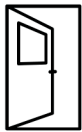
Have you concerns about a child's sexual behaviour?

The Pathway Programme is a new harmful & problematic sexual behaviour service funded by Derbyshire County Council Public Health and Children's Services.. The service adopts a consultation model, offering up to six consultations per referral.

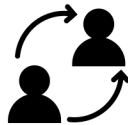
How might this help me?Eligibility CriteriaHow can I refer?



The Pathway Programme offers expert advice and guidance to professionals supporting a child who is displaying concerning sexual behaviour.. Our support is tailor made to meet the needs of each child and can include advice about safety planning, sharing of resources to be used by other professionals working with the child, supervision and guidance of direct work, and recommendations and signposting where specialist direct work is indicated. We welcome the involvement of parents and seek to provide them with a safe space to explore their concerns.



The service is available to all children living in Derbyshire who are not in the care of the Local Authority. There needs to be a key professional involved with the child i.e. educational, health or social care.
